However, she is one of four so I anticipate more action on this front in the next few years. Mind you keeping in mind the level of social change who knows they may well take other options. Not even a possibility with our family, where every wedding is a gathering of major significance. Oh well it was a thought.

This week has been nothing short of action packed to the max. The school hosted the circus program with Bec Cooen and her team once again having an astonishing impact on all our students. Including our visitors from Clare Public School and St Joseph's. Just when you imagined that that was enough, but wait there's more! Bell Shakespeare were also here doing workshops with all students. Plus they will be here this week as well. How rich are the offerings our lucky students are exposed to across the year. Just on a quick aside there have been in excess of 900 emails regarding this already. So without a doubt the feelings are very strong about this fantastic program.

This week will also see the students from Maitland Grossman High School return a visit to our school. Their students have been billeted in the community. Can I thank everyone who has made this much appreciated gesture at this most difficult time of the year. You are truly awesome.

My only response after all of that is "are we there yet"? The answer is a very loud "no way". There are still a heap of things to get done before the end of term. So strap in it will be a wild but fun ride.

Our first School Development Day next year will be held on Monday, 4 February. This will replace the one at the end of the year on Friday, 21 December. # **K-12 NOTES**

#### **Hot Weather**

As you will be aware last week the hot summer weather arrived, not so much with a bang but a nuclear explosion! Balranald even made the Channel Seven Sunrise weather report on Friday morning with its 46°C day on Thursday! Please remember to send students to school with a water bottle and a hat and remind them to sip water and remain hydrated in these hot conditions. As part of the school Sun Safe Policy, students must wear a hat to participate in outdoor sporting and playground activities during the school day. Students should also ensure they do not suffer from dehydration by drinking water at regular intervals during the day, especially at the end of recess and lunch. Primary students are allowed to take a water bottle containing fresh water into their classrooms during lessons and students should be encouraged to bring water bottles to school. Please be aware that water bottles containing juice or cordial are NOT allowed in Primary classrooms.

All secondary students are reminded that they must wear a hat for any activity outside. This includes sport, PASS, PDHPE, agriculture, recess and lunchtimes. If they do not have a hat they will be asked to remain under the hanger/COLA. The students have been told they can bring water bottles to class during hot weather.

#### **Primary Assemblies – Change to Organisation**

Due to the school hall being used for the Circus Program last week, the Primary Assembly planned for last Friday was postponed and will now be held this Friday, 7 December 2012. The assembly will also be held at the earlier time of 9.50am, as the hall is required for Bell Shakespeare workshops after recess. The assembly will be presented by Year 5/6, with the assembly also including speeches from Year 5 students nominating for election as a Primary Captain for 2013. After the assembly primary students will have the opportunity to vote for Primary Captains for 2013. Students are reminded that if they are eligible for a Primary Merit Certificate they are to have their 5 Achievement Awards to Mr Allen by the Wednesday before Primary Assembly. All parents and community members are welcome to attend.

#### **Bronze and Silver Awards Assembly**

Because there will be no Whole School Assembly this term, there will be a special Primary Assembly on Wednesday, 12 December at 11.00am, where Primary students will receive their Bronze and Silver Awards. #### Cricket Report V Batlow - Stage 2

Just a brief overview, of last week's report. We made 150 runs.

Batlow fancied their chances to chase down our score and watching their openers scoff down their ham and pickle sandwiches, the indication was they were loading up on carbs and protein ready to settle in to an afternoons batting. Our opening bowlers, Michael 'Mr Positive' Simpson and Bailey 'Twinkle Toes' Brougham settled for a can of coke and half a dozen lolly snakes. They were still comparing how far their 6's went (by the end of the day Simmo's had grown wings and travelled an extra 100m and had landed half way to Leeton). They were not too worried about where to land their first delivery.

Hibberson and Williams opened the innings for Batlow and made their intentions known early with a couple of play and misses. A single in the first over completed the scoring leaving a run rate of just over 3.5 runs per over to win the game. Hibberson played out a maiden to 'Twinkle Toes' first over looking solid in defence. In 'Mr Positive's' second over disaster struck for the batting team. Williams skied an attempted pull and was brilliantly caught by a pumped up 'Wild One' and Hibberson took a leaf from the Lockhart boys and decided to miss a straight one leaving Batlow 2 for 7, with a couple of snicks over slips from young Floyd Cross providing the runs. With both openers back in the shed and the ham and pickles gone to waste, the Balranald bowlers went for the jugular. There is nothing like a sugar fix to excite teenage boys and snakes and coke is possibly the best combination next to red bull and cool mints. 'Mr Positive' and 'Twinkle Toes' were bowling great line and length that was testing the Batlow batters. 'Fuzz' and Floyd, (yep), that is his real name. I even asked him) started to settle in and play some shots and it was game on. The breakthrough came in 'Twinkle Toes' last over when a fullish short ball was misjudged with middle stump being rearranged.

3 for 35 after 10 over's wasn't going to win many games and when 'Big Drizzle the Magician' came on bowling what could only be described as .... I can't describe them, and took the prize wicket of the Batlow captain, the end was in sight. 'Drizzle' kept himself on for 5 overs with the chance he might actually hit the pitch at some time. It didn't matter as he was moving his full tosses both ways and confusing all around him. He ended up with 3 for 8, making up for his lack of involvement earlier in the day. Breaking the bail as he destroyed the castle of the Batlow number 7 was one of the highlights for 'The Magician'. 'Twigs' Lockhart came into the attack at the same time and proceeded in his three overs, to bring Batlow back into the game. 'Twigs' is a lovely chap and does his best to always make sure everyone his having a good time. His mix of long hops and pies was an interesting mix and young Tom Mouat was helping himself with his own mix of 4's and 6's. I've heard of buying a wicket, but 'Twigs' was definitely paying too much for this one. 'Twigs' got the last laugh however, after some sledging from young 'Leaves' Lockhart (who you playing for?) when he had Mouat well caught by 'The Stud' for 28 runs. 'The Stud' was looking good behind the stumps gloving everything cleanly and the 'helmet hair' gel was still proving effective.

Aaron 'The Wild Thing' Gervasi and Jacob 'Globe' Lister were brought into the attack to control the run rate. The frightening pace barrage from 'The Wild One' was too much for Hardwick and he skied a defensive pull shot that travelled well out to the mid-wicket boundary. Young Dayle 'My Way' Barrett, playing his first game of serious cricket, sprinted at approximately 24km/hr and took a diving catch just above the grass, but not low enough to create doubt in the umpire's mind, to dismiss the batsman. The 'Globe' was bowling his dinky little straight spinners, trying to entice the batters to go the tonk. He gave up a couple of boundaries just to keep it interesting but generally kept the batters in the dark.

The Captain in consultation with his co-Captain Simpson decided to finish proceedings and threw the ball to Connor 'The Italian Connection' Soraggi and Dayle 'My Way' Barrett. These boys have been super impressive in the nets and deserved the opportunity to test their mettle in the heat of battle. 'My Way' ran in strong and hit the pitch hard, combining well with 'The Italian Connection' continually putting the Batlow batters under pressure. At this point we realised Batlow did indeed bat low with their number 9 scoring well. 'My Way' collected his first wicket shortly after when he had the Batlow number 10 caught for an impressive 17 runs. 'Leaves' Lockhart sprinted 30m, stuck out the left duke and managed to hang on to an absolute pearler of a catch. It was this type of fielding that typified the effort the Balranald boys were applying. So impressed was 'Big Drizz' that he brought 'Leaves' Lockhart (the youngest and smallest of the 'Condoulpe' crowd) on to bowl. At 9 for 102 the pressure was still on and breaking this last partnership would be crucial to deciding the winner of the match. To make things more difficult for Batlow it was decided to bring on the other debutant Tom 'The Rock' Salau to bowl some express pace in partnership with 'Leaves'. Although a recent addition to the team, his steely resolve and ability to ignore opposition sledging has won him many admirers. It had been noted at training that 'Leaves' would struggle on the longer pitches to get the ball to the other end. We describe his bowling as express medium pace as it leaves his hand and extremely slow by the time it gets to the batsman. He did worry the lower order Batlow players but it was left to the lad with the long name 'The Italian Connection' to finish things off by cleaning up the middle peg of the Batlow number 11.

All out for 106 and after a few scary moments Balranald had come up trumps. Their desperation in the field and desire to enjoy every moment showed the opposition how the game should be played. Well played by all the boys.

We are encouraged to go for 2 fruit and 5 vegetables every day. The amount children should eat depends on their, age, appetite and activity levels.



The emphasis in education should be on eating a variety of fruit and vegetables (including raw, cooked and different colours). This provides a wide range of nutrients.

The Australian Guide to Healthy Eating recommends that children and adolescents eat the following number of serves of fruit and vegetables per day.


Age of child (years	Fruit (serves)	Vegetables (serves)	
4-7	1-2	2-4	
8-11	1-2	3-5	
12-18	3-4	4-9	

#### What is a serve?

A serve of fruit is equal to an average sized piece of fruit.



A serve of vegetables is equal to one medium potato, ½ cup cooked vegetables or legumes or 1 cup salad.
