Year 8/9 Excursion to Sydney





NPWS FIELD OFFICER TRAINEESHIPS

Today, Minister for the Environment, the Hon. Robyn Parker, announced a new NPWS Field Officer Traineeship Program. The program has been developed in response to the need for succession planning. It will involve an intake of up to 100 trainees across NSW over the next two years. The first intake is proposed for June 2014 with subsequent intakes planned at six monthly intervals.

Field staff are highly valued and integral to the running of NPWS. A recent workforce planning analysis identified that more than 50% of current field staff are over the age of 45 and approximately 20% are over the age of 55, making succession planning for these roles a priority. The program will allow us to bring new employees into the agency and train them to become experienced field officers before staff turnover impacts on our ability to deliver critical services.

The program will be open to everyone but particularly hopes to attract women, young people and Aboriginal people, to encourage diversity in these roles. The new program is supported by training through a Registered Training Organisation, coaching and on the job training. Following successful completion of the two year program, trainees will be offered a permanent, entry level field officer position, subject to the needs of NPWS.

We are still finalising the details for where these positions will be based. To assist this process we are inviting people to register their interest in the NPWS Field Officer Traineeship program. Please forward information on the NPWS Field Officer Traineeship program to anyone you think may be interested in applying, whether that be to individuals, local schools or community groups.
