It's Pirate Week @ BCS

Ahoy there! And yes, who better to give us life lessons here at school than the lessons we learn from Jack Sparrow, Pirate of the Caribbean, as we sail the Seven Seas @ BCS.

#1 Find something you love, and never let it go: Jack's one true love is his ship, the Black Pearl, and he'll literally do anything to get her back. That's the kind of dedication we want at school. When we look at the pride that's needed to create a Year 8 skateboard or a fantasy creature we can see what is possible when you try hard at school.
