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
Hull's Happenings

Year 8 Science

The Year 8 class completed their practical assessment last Monday. They were required to separate 1g of salt from a solution using the evaporation method that they designed. The scientific write up for this assessment is due today via their Google Document. Last Wednesday, someone left a note on our Science Lab door explaining that they had stolen our turtle, Bubbles. Year 8 performed a chromatography

experiment, where we separate colours based on their density, and concluded that the ink from Mr Christian's pen matched the ink found on the note. Mr Christian confessed and Bubbles was returned back to his tank.

Year 8 End of Year Science Examination is on today. The students will be assessed on forces, structure and properties of matter and separation. The Separating Mixtures unit will conclude this week and we will move onto the Solar System to finish off our year in Science.



Year 9/10 Science

We have been busy in class finishing off our Chemical Reactions unit. Students have been investigating Acid/Base reactions, metal displacement reactions and the affects acid rain has on our historic buildings and environment. Students completed a practical assessment task last Tuesday, where they created an activity series of metals with acid. Students concluded that Magnesium was the most reactive in hydrochloric acid while Copper was the least reactive.

Year 9/10 End of Year Science Examination is also on today. Students will be assessed on chemical reactions, electricity and dynamic earth units. We will finish our Chemical Reactions unit this week and move onto a practical skills unit and forensic unit to conclude the year.

Year 12 Chemistry

Seth has been busy this fortnight with equilibrium calculations. He performed a depth study, which looked at how we can use colourimetry to calculate concentrations of chemical species. Seth then uses this data to calculate equilibrium constants for specific reactions. Over the next few weeks, we will be looking at specific equilibrium reactions in action.





We visited the site where Kingsford Smith landed in 1933, taking lucky locals for joy rides. The students gave Mr Comi a brief history lesson. Thank you, Mr Comi, for driving the bus.



Can you believe this man travelled on the wing of the Southern Cross from Broome to Port Hedland? He certainly was desperate to get home!

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Year 1/2 have been learning about people and places of historical significance. We enjoyed a visit to Friends of the Southern Cross where we learnt about Sir Charles Kingsford Smith. "Smithy" made the first transpacific flight, taking over 83hrs to complete. A huge thank you to Mr Jacka and Mr Pope for helping us to appreciate our local history.

MENTAL HEALTH HUB FOR STUDENTS, PARENTS AND TEACHERS

Students, parents and teachers will now have easily accessible mental health advice and support at their fingertips, with the NSW Government today launching their new online *Mental Health Hub.*

Minister for Education Sarah Mitchell said the website has been developed to ensure advice is available to anyone who needs it, at any time.

"Mental health support for our students has to be varied and accessible for everyone," Ms Mitchell said.

"We know that overwhelmingly students do their own research before they reach out for help, so we need to make sure that information is accessible and designed for our school communities.

Minister for Mental Health Bronnie Taylor said the *Mental Health Hub* will be a useful toolkit for students, parents and teachers.

"The hub has some really practical resources, from tips on how to start a conversation with someone doing it tough to finding ways to improve their own mental fitness," Mrs Taylor said.

The website is broken down into three categories; information for parents, information for teachers and information for students.

"The hub has been designed for everyone in the school community, I encourage anyone who has questions, stressed or wants to know how to support people in their lives," Ms Mitchell said.

The site can be accessed by teachers, parents and students across every school sector, including independent and catholic schools, and has had input from leading mental health advocacy groups, including ReachOut, headspace, Kids Helpline and Beyond Blue.

CLIMATE CHANGE ADAPTIVE PRIVATE DOMESTIC WATER SUPPLIES ON RURAL AND REMOTE PROPERTIES

Balranald Shire Council is undertaking a survey of water adequacy and quality for the *Increasing Resilience to Climate Change Project* funded by the NSW Department of Local Government and assisted by NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment. This is being done in order to:

- help to ensure that everyone can have adequate and safe household water supplies
- better appreciate the water supply problems being confronted by residents in the Shire living on rural properties or using rainwater tanks
- identify any possible health risks that may be present due to the quality of the water that is being used

Council are inviting people on rural and remote properties in the Shire who are dependent on private sources of water for their household use to participate in this collaboration. Private sources include surface water from farm dams or creeks or rivers, ground water from deep or shallow bores, and rainwater tanks that capture runoff from roofs.

People in Balranald and Euston who have rainwater tanks for household use (eg drinking, cooking, showers, bathing and children's play) are also invited to participate in the project by completing the survey.
